What is Domconsult?

It is a small group of Dominican Lay folk who function as an executive group to respond to, consult, inform, those who are part of our national organic and responsive collective of Dominican Laity.

Susan Healy Teresa McNamara Moira Gallagher

Susan is an alumna of the Maori Studies Department of the University of Auckland, and continues to explore and educate others in considerations of Maori/pakeha interactions. She edited and contributed to "Listening to the people of the land: Christianity, Colonisation and the Path to redemption" She is a contributor to the Tui Motu edition that has just achieved an award for breadth of contributions. She is a longtime member of Pax Christi. Susan lives with and cares for her mother in an Auckland Retirement Village.

Teresa is employed by the Auckland Catholic Diocese as Manager, Project, Systems and Performance. Until recently responsible for the youth mission of the diocese. She is the

administrator of the Dominican webpage and its Facebook page. She is an active member of the World Skills international network. Her photos of her daily walks in Auckland on Facebook are a delight.

Moira tells us:

My mother, Jeanne, is a faithful Dominican layperson and has been a great influence on me. I was educated by Dominican sisters in Dunedin and became a primary teacher. I taught in Waipukarau and then spent two years in the Dominican tertiary chaplaincy team in Auckland in the 1980s. I was fortunate to live and teach in Invercargill, Dunedin, Gore, and Wellington. My health deteriorated in my mid-thirties, I returned home to Dunedin and have lived a much quieter life since then. I have a small role with young children in a Dominican school, which I love. I'm also involved in the NZ Christian meditation community, the Dunedin Presbyterian/Catholic Dialogue group, and a wonderful Dominican study group.

Kay Price. Tells us:

I have been educated and influenced by Dominican sisters in Invercargill from the age of 5 until 18. Have always been drawn to the Dominican Way and after shifting back to Invercargill in the late 70s, joined the 3rd order (*as it was known then*) at St Catherine's. Shifted up to Christchurch in the 90s and felt isolated from the Dominicans, so was pleased to be invited to a national gathering in Auckland. I have felt very honoured to be part of the Dominican Mission and Justice team.

Willie Campbell says:

I am a widow who has spent almost all her life living south of the Waitaki River. My initial Dominican formation was also below that river, at St Patrick's, Teschemakers in North Otago. My working life has been in education with young children, senior primary and then adults. I am the organist at my parish church and a member of a small study group that explores the practice of the Dominican Charism in our daily lives.

The other group that you may hear about from time to time is:

Dominican Family Mission and Justice Committee.

This group was originally a Sisters Committee. It then expanded to include the Friars and later, Laity. It has been seen as an important source for the three branches of the Family to connect, share information and discuss how our mission translates into our daily lives. Individual members then take back to their own networks' information, challenges and resources. The environment in which we function has changed markedly in the last few years and it has been agreed that this group now has reached its useful time of completion. A final meeting to put it to rest is planned for later in the year.
